What is Title I?

Bollman Bridge School Goals

English Language Arts - In Language Arts, we use a balanced literacy approach to meet the needs of students. Instruction is based on-going data collection to determine the needs of students. In intermediate grades, teachers use the Independent Daily Reading (IDR) framework. IDR provides students independent reading time during the language arts block to choose and read books based on their interests and preferences. Teachers work with students to set reading goals so that they are excited about and engaged in reading. Our goal is to create lifelong readers ready for the demands of college and careers.

Math – Grade 3 students develop a foundation for multiplication and division. They develop an understanding of these operations and work to develop fluency with basic multiplication and division facts within 100. They solve many types of story problems, including two step problems with more than one operation. Grade 3 students also focus on fractions. They develop foundational understanding of fractions as parts of a region and on a number line. Grade 3 students also develop fluency with addition and subtraction within 1,000.

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Math - Grade 4 students extend their work in multiplication and division to work with multi-digit numbers; we encourage them to use strategies that make sense to them that are based on place value and properties of operations. Their work with fractions includes an emphasis on equivalent fractions, comparison of fractions, as well as decomposition of fractions ($\frac{3}{4}$ is the same as 3 copies of $\frac{1}{4}$, or $3 \times \frac{1}{4}$). Their work with fraction computation begins as they add and subtract fractions with like denominators and multiply a whole number times a fraction ($3 \times \frac{3}{4}$, which means three copies of $\frac{3}{4}$).

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Math - Grade 5 students continue to work on multi-digit multiplication and division and are introduced to the traditional algorithm for multiplication. They read, write, and compare decimals. They add and subtract fractions with unlike denominators, and also learn to multiply a fraction times a whole number ($\frac{3}{4} \times 3$) and a fraction times a fraction.

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
